YOUNG ENGINEERS FIRST LEGO LEAGUE NATIONAL FINAL

On Saturday 16th February, the Reigate School Young Engineers team met at School at 6am; an early start for a long day, but this was the First Lego League National Final. Arriving at the University of the West of England to witness the opening ceremony, the sense of spectacle was apparent. It was a big event. Sixty teams from England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales, all regional champions, all competing under the same roof. There were 10 competition tables, 20 practice tables and five separate rooms for presentations, team working, problem solving and robot inspection. There were robots of all shapes, sizes and capabilities. The itinerary for the day was detailed and non-stop.



The first event was Robot Design, something the team was proud of thanks to its evolutionary development over the past four years. The judges were impressed by their approach to solving problems posed by the layout of the obstacles on the board. The attachments were innovative and effective and the programming of the robot was simple and efficient. They chose to make only one change from the regional round, the development of an attachment to complete three tasks in one, a feature appreciated by the judges.

The next challenge was the first of three robot games. The robot struggled to make its first moves, but recovered to complete some of the more complex tasks, navigating the length of a three-meter board.

Task three was a presentation on "How people can stay healthy in Space". They had designed an exercise machine aimed to prevent potential muscle degradation that could occur in a zero gravity environment. They made changes from their regional presentation by adding in sources to their work and showing more of the development of their prototypes, however they had not practised and this was evident as the presentation overran and the team struggled to recover.



Round four was the second of the robot games. This started better than round one and the first set of attachments worked to perfection, however the robot ran into problems as it moved down the board and a failed challenge docked the team some points - but a credible 56 points had the team inside the top half of the table.

The problem solving and teamwork challenge involved the team being given eight objects to put into order of priority for someone living in space. The objects included flares, oxygen, a compass and water. They were given two minutes to discuss their choice whilst the judges monitored their progress. The team worked well and gave good reasoning for their choices.

The final task of the day for the Reigate School Young Engineers was their third robot game. Unfortunately for the team, the performance in this round did not reflect their hard efforts of the previous months and the robot failed to score any points. The day was done, the team exhausted, but proud of all they had achieved in their first ever visit to the First Lego League National finals.

On the second day the groups were even fortunate enough to meet and have photos taken with youtuber Ryan Taylor. All in all, a very successful trip.

DETERMINATION OF SURREY'S SCHOOL ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS FOR COMMUNITY AND VOLUNTARY CONTROLLED SCHOOLS FOR SEPTEMBER 2020

The admission arrangements for Surrey's community and voluntary controlled schools for 2020 admission and Surrey's primary and secondary coordinated schemes for 2020 have now been determined. Full details are available on the school admissions pages of Surrey County Council website under 'Admission arrangements and outcomes' – www.surreycc.gov.uk/admissions.

As part of the determination the following changes have been applied:

- 1. Furzefield Primary, Reigate & Banstead: reduction of Reception PAN from 60 to 58.
- 2. Wallace Fields Junior, Epsom & Ewell: change to the measuring points used to assess nearest school and home to school distance.
- 3. Children previously in state care outside England who left that care as a result of being adopted: inclusion within criterion 2 for children with an exceptional social/ medical need.

Any person or body who considers that any aspect of these admission arrangements are unlawful or not in compliance with the School Admissions Code or relevant law relating to admissions, can make an objection to the Office of the Schools Adjudicator. Objections must be referred by 15th May 2019 and further information on how to make an objection can be obtained from the Office of the Schools Adjudicator website.

SPORTS NEWS

DISTRICT GYMNASTICS

On Tuesday 26th February 11 children from Years 7-9 competed in the District Gymnastics Competition. This competition was fiercely attended by five other schools (Oakwood School, Caterham School, Royal Alexandra and Albert School, Oxted School and The Warwick School) all hoping to take the victory. Our gymnasts worked tirelessly to prepare and polish their routines, hoping to impress the judges with their talents and hard work. They only had one opportunity to demonstrate their abilities on the floor before competing in the vault section where they had two chances to perfectly execute their vaults. The children were split into 'School' and 'Elite' sections which meant we had the potential to take home the medals in both categories. The 'Elite' section is for gymnasts who compete in competitions outside of school, allowing them to display their excellent tumbling passes and advanced vaulting skills.

Focusing on the Year 7 competitors, we put on an excellent show of talent with six entrants in this age group, evenly split between the 'School' and 'Elite' categories. Bodi got gold in the elite section, consistently performing throughout each piece of apparatus. Eric also got gold competing in the school section. He had a slightly rocky start with a tumble on the vault but managed to salvage this with an excellent second vault and strong floor routine. Lily-Rae and Scarlett both competed in the elite section demonstrating excellent control and composure throughout, placing 8th and 11th respectively. Similarly Anna and Isabelle performed strongly in the school section, taking 6th and 9th place with Anna missing out on 3rd place by only 0.6 of a point.



Both Anise and Gabriella competed in the Year 8 girls' school section with poise and elegance when on the floor. Their vaults were executed well with a stable landing, both earning high scores in this section. Anise secured 3rd with Gabriella just behind in 4th place.

Lastly, we had three competitors in the Year 9 girls' category with Susannah competing in the school section and Rebecca and Annabel competing in the elite section. Susannah put on an excellent performance, perfectly executing her vaults and remaining composed throughout her floor routine. She secured 2nd place, after coming joint 1st – this result only being split by their floor execution score! An amazing, well fought performance from Susannah. The Year 9 girls' elite section was nail-bitingly intense! All girls in this category were fighting hard for the title, consistently performing well and unwilling to drop the intensity. Rebecca and Annabel's vaults were both worthy of 1st place, scoring 8.9s leaving it all down to their floor routine. The other competitor performed on the floor first, setting the bar high. Rebecca matched this easily, showing her outstanding acrobatic training to create her tumbling passes. Annabel closed the competition with an equally strong, winning routine – deservedly earning her the gold medal. Rebecca placed 3rd by 0.3 of a point.

A very proud day for Reigate School, with all competitors showing determination and wonderful manners throughout.

Teenagers are rewarding, stimulating and fun, but being a parent of one can be stressful and challenging.

The Talking Teens Parent Group helps deal with those challenges so you can have a calmer, happier family life.

A tried and tested Programme, it helps us think about what we do, why we do it and how it makes us feel and looks at questions that many parents have, like:

How can I stop my child always getting the last word?

Why do they always sleep in so late?

Can I do anything to help them argue less?

What's normal?

Why don't they want to tell me how they're feeling?

Information for parents and carers



ATTENDANCE

We would like to remind all parents and children about the importance of regular school attendance. Children are expected to attend 100% of the time, be punctual every day and show good behaviour in lessons. Parents are expected to phone the absence line on every day of absence to notify the school of the reason for your child's absence.

Telephone number: 01737 245241 (Available 24 hours). Your message should include your child's name, tutor group, reason for absence and your name.

This year, good attendance, punctuality and behaviour are being rewarded with a trip to Thorpe Park in the summer term for Years 7-10. To qualify your child must have 95 points, which is made up from 95% attendance and points awarded because of good behaviour on their reports each term. Children can also lose points for poor behaviour on their reports and for persistent lateness.

What are acceptable reasons for absence?

Some examples are vomiting, diarrhoea, high temperature, hospital appointments, and funerals.

Unacceptable reasons include:

Headache, tiredness, stomach-ache, colds, coughs, birthdays, haircuts, shopping days, duvet days! Children who have broken bones can normally be accommodated in school after discussion with Heads of Year.

Leave of absence during term time

It is highly unlikely that the Head of School will grant permission for a leave of absence during term time. These can only be considered in the most exceptional circumstances and must be applied for in advance using the absence request form available from the office. Please refer to the Attendance Policy on the school website for more information.

Will I be made aware if my child's attendance is low?

Yes, if their attendance falls below an acceptable level, a letter of concern will be sent to you and you may be asked to provide medical evidence. If there is no improvement a meeting will be arranged to discuss the situation and you may be referred to the Education Welfare Service. The Government guidelines state that if your child falls below 90% attendance they are classed as persistently absent.

YEAR 11 GCSE EXAM NOTICE

Please be aware that the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) requires <u>all Year 11 children</u> to be available until the 27th June 2019. This is because an awarding body (exam board) may need to invoke its contingency plan which would require children to go into their school up until the 27th June 2019. In light of this, please do not book holidays that begin before the 27th June 2019 or other events that would mean your child would be unable to come into school.




