CARNEGIE TRIP TO WITNESS FOR THE PROSECUTION



Every year the Carnegie Shadowing Group read all eight of the books shortlisted for the Carnegie Medal.

This year the winner was 'The Poet X' by Elizabeth Acevedo. It wasn't our personal favourite. We would recommend 'Long Way Down' by Jason Reynolds and Chris Priestley; 'Rebound' by Kwame Alexander and 'The House With Chicken Legs' by Sophie Anderson.





To celebrate their hard work the group went on a trip to London to explore the Southbank and to see Agatha Christie's play 'Witness For The Prosecution'. We got off the train at beautiful Blackfriars Station which is built on a bridge over the river and walked along the Southbank towards the National Theatre. When we arrived we were greeted by staff and invited to take part in a special project to celebrate the 70th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Artist Ai Weiwei was commissioned to create a celebration flag. So the National Theatre was spending last week scanning people's footprints and printing them on scrap fabrics left over from past productions at the theatre. These have been used to create eco-friendly bunting around the outside of the theatre.

After taking part in the project and exploring the National Theatre book shop we headed off to the secondhand book and comic stalls under Waterloo Bridge. We ended the morning exploring the Southbank Centre before heading to Jubilee Gardens for lunch.

'I really enjoyed walking around London and seeing all the memorable buildings by the Thames and I enjoyed looking at the Graffiti Art in the skate




park next to the river. I also enjoyed eating our lunch in the sun next to the London Eye.' *Thomas*

UNIVERSITY OF BIRMINGHAM CONFERENCE

Here at Reigate School, we are moving to a system of immediate verbal feedback in lessons rather than written marking completed by the teacher after the event when learning has moved on.

The Humanities department have been one of the departments that has trialled various techniques with this, and through one of my connections with teacher, author and grass roots conference organiser, Victoria Hewitt, I was asked to speak at the University of Birmingham's department of education on Saturday 22nd June about how we have implemented these new techniques here at Reigate School.

The conference was attended by 100 Geography teachers from all over the country, and speakers presented about a range of topics relating to the teaching of the subject. My particular presentation was scheduled to immediately follow Alan Parkinson, the current Vice Principle of the Geographical Association and a very eloquent speaker! However, having



already provided inset training to staff at Reigate School about the same topic, I felt that I did a good job in conveying the success we are having with verbal feedback. So much so, that during the panel discussion at the end of the conference, several questions from delegates in the audience were directed at me by teachers desperate to know more about how they too could implement these methods. All in all, although it was a slightly nerve-wracking experience, had it not been for the fact that Reigate School is such an innovative and forward-thinking school, I would not have had the chance to use these methods and disseminate them to the wider teaching community.


