## TEXTILES AT BRIGHTON



On Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> November all Year 10 GCSE Textile students went on a trip to visit two museums in Brighton. The objective of going on this trip was to collect lots of different types of sketches and studies of what we could see, in lots of different styles. These included: a quick sketch (a quick two minute drawing of an item); a detailed sketch (where you spend around 15 minutes on a sketch); Biro drawings (all of your sketch) must been drawn in Biro). Lastly we had do draw motifs which can potentially be used or give us ideas on patterns we can use to put onto our aprons which is our main project we are working towards.



The first museum we went to was originally meant to be the Booth Museum but with a few complications and issues through no fault of our own we ended up at the

Hove Museum. We were greeted with the Jaipur Gate which was originally created as the entrance. The impressive structure was the gate that marked the entry to the Rajputana (now Rajasthan) section of the exhibition. My favourite exhibition was the film and photography display. I personally enjoy photos and it was interesting to see all of the old cameras on display and how they were used, together with how photographs were developed since 1888 to now. It also fascinated me how cartoon animations were created and how much it has changed in such a short space of time. The museum had many other exhibits including Wizards' Attic which consisted of old toys and other childlike things



from the past. 3D abstract sculptures and also paintings were on display too.

After having stopped outside the Brighton Pavilion for a spot of lunch we then went into the Pavilion and into the Brighton Museum. Here we also saw many exhibits. Being greeted firstly by the modern 20<sup>th</sup> century and then a contrasting Georgian display, I instantly knew that I would be able to get various motif ideas and inspiration. My favourite exhibition was

the Ocean Blues display. This particular display showed how litter has polluted the surrounding areas. They showed how even tiny cola bottle caps can cause such damage to animals. The display also showed real preserved animals in the exact position in which the animals devastatingly died. This exhibit was a real eye opener to how littering is such a dangerous issue and how something as simple as walking a few steps to a bin can resolve this issue.



I really enjoyed our trip to Brighton and it has given me lots of inspirational ideas I can use and interpret into my own work in the future.
