We were enthralled by the way the set moved at different points in the play and by its design. The way they used proportion and perspective really emphasised some of the social concepts Priestley

Then after their faults had been exposed their house collapsed. Overall it was a brilliant and illuminating trip and we would like to thank all of the staff from the English Department who made it possible for us to see it.
