Sadie Jenkins (Year 10) for her superb space work and for also getting the highest score in the Easter Science quiz.


MATHS

REIGATE SCHOOL INSTAGRAM ART GALLERY




When we went into lockdown we set up an Instagram art gallery to exhibit the fantastic art work that is going on at home.




THE GREAT LANGUAGE CHALLENGE


Stay positive, keep learning
