CARNEGIE SHADOWING GROUP TRIP TO LES MISERABLES

How many amazing experiences can 21 students and three teachers cram into one day? On Wednesday 29th June the Carnegie Shadowing group went for the record!

After braving the stormy waters of picking a train to London that actually runs (if not on time at least it went straight there) and the tube and sauntering along Oxford Street we found ourselves outside the Queen's Theatre 15 minutes early for our backstage tour. The tour began with some fascinating information about the show's costumes. We found out that they have kept all of the costumes made in 32 years of the show and when new cast members take over roles they go to a big warehouse to try on every costume worn by their predecessors – if it fits they wear it. How's that for legacy? Then they gave us the opportunity to try some on.

They also told us that in the first act the cast have to wear all six costumes on top of each other because the changes are so quick. And if you see someone come on with a baby, it's because they didn't have time to put their costume down before going back on stage. Also every costume and wig is washed after every performance.

Then we were taken into the auditorium to find out about the history of the Queen's Theatre and what happened when it was bombed during the war, among other adventures, before being taken onto the stage.

We were shown all the little secrets about the props and scenery. The wings are tiny and the changes are so quick that everything has to be really well organised - but we can't show you any of that because pictures are not allowed. At the end they let us have our picture taken on stage so long as we had the auditorium behind us not the set!



That was just the first hour. Next we were whisked off to another theatre down the road for a Workshop. This was amazing because it really brought to life the emotions and lives of the people portrayed in the show and how focused the actors have to be all the time so that we believe that they actually are the character they are playing. The actors can't use too many props because of the pace of the show, so lots of their acting is mimed meaning you really have to think about what you are pretending to be holding to make it look real. How heavy is it? How hard will you throw something? What sort of recoil will a gun have when you fire it and how will you reload it?

In one hour we tried out the same bonding exercises a new cast uses to get to know each other quickly, how to show our character by just standing up, how to create interesting shapes and levels to portray a barricade, how to fight and die in slow motion (just like they do in the show) and we performed our own version of the barricade scene with music, costumes and props.



Finally, after lunch we were in the audience to see an outstanding matinee performance that required lots of tissues to mop up the tears and earned the cast a standing ovation. Is that enough or should we go for more next year?
