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## MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Last Friday was a day of very mixed emotions for me. During the morning the school was disrupted by a small group of Year 11 students that behaved in a totally unacceptable way. At Reigate School, however, we expect high standards of behaviour at all times and will not tolerate what we experienced on that day. On Thursday Mr Alexander and I led assemblies for Years 7 to 11 to reassure all of the students who behave wonderfully all of the time that the behaviour some of them had witnessed had been dealt with in the most severe manner.

Although the start of Friday was very disappointing and upsetting, my mood was transformed by the Year 11 Leavers' Assembly that took place in the afternoon. Many members of staff and students had put a great deal of effort into preparing and delivering a fabulous celebration of the Year 11 students' time at Reigate School.

I then had the immense privilege of seeing students presented with their awards at our Celebration of Success event later that evening (recipient list below). This was the first time we had combined all of the year group awards in one celebration and held it at Reigate Baptist Church. We had an excellent guest speaker, Sue Thearle, who shared stories and insights into the world of sports journalism. We also paid tribute to Mr Gilmore who has taught at the school for 40 years. It really was a wonderfully uplifting and enjoyable event.

Both of the celebrations on Friday showcased some fantastic musical talents, confident public speaking, as well as achievements in a wide range of areas. I told the students at the awards evening that I believed Reigate School students were the best students in the world and that the award winners represented the best of the best. Well done to all.

There will be **four** Light Drawing sessions throughout the day.






## **Big Bang Fair South East**
