YEAR 9 CHEMISTRY


Well done to 9RB and 9RC who have made some fantastic posters in Chemistry. All groups worked very hard and researched information about the periodic table.





2. Group-think and persuasion
3. How to develop self-worth and confidence
4. Gender identity, transphobia and gender-based discrimination
5. How to recognise and challenge homophobia and biphobia
6. How to recognise and challenge racism and religious discrimination

Year 9

The **Topic** is: *Respectful relationships*

The **Lessons** are;

1. Different types of families and parenting
2. Positive relationships in the home and how to reduce homelessness
3. Conflict and its causes in different contexts e.g. family and friends
4. Conflict resolution strategies
5. How to manage relationship and family changes e.g. breakups, separations and divorces
6. How to access support services

Year 10

The **Topic** is: *Healthy relationships*

The **Lessons** will include the following topics;

1. Relationship values and the role of pleasure in relationships
2. Assumptions, misconceptions and social norms about sex, gender and relationships
3. Opportunities and risks in forming relationships online
4. Managing the impact of the media and porn on sexual attitudes, expectations and behaviours
5. The ethical and legal implications in relation to consent inc. manipulation coercion and capacity to consent
6. How to recognise and respond to pressure, coercion and exploitation, inc. reporting and accessing appropriate support
7. How to recognise and challenge victim blaming
8. Asexuality, abstinence and celibacy

The **Topic** is: *Healthy relationships*

The **Lessons** will include;

1. Core Values and emotions
2. Sex and gender
3. Effective communication
4. Unwanted attention, harassment and stalking
5. Abusive relationships and support

ONLINE SAFETY – CYBERBULLYING

Cyberbullying is when a person or a group of people uses the internet, mobile phones, online games or any other kind of digital technology to threaten, tease, upset or humiliate someone else (definition from Childline: Cyberbullying is just as harmful as bullying in the real world and may, in some cases, result in prosecution by the Police. Those who take part in online bullying often use a group of friends to target their victims by asking them to add a comment to a photo on a blog, or asking them to forward it onto another group of friends.)

Types of Cyberbullying

There are lots of different types of cyberbullying. These are the main ones:

Email:

- Sending emails that can be threatening or upsetting to a single target, or to a group of people to encourage them to become part of the bullying.
- These messages or 'hate mails' can include examples of racism, sexism and other types of prejudice.

Instant messenger and chatrooms:

- Sending instant messenger and chatroom messages to friends or direct to a victim.
- Others can be invited into the bullying conversation, who then become part of it by laughing.

Social networking sites:

- Setting up profiles on social networking sites to make fun of someone.
- By visiting these pages or contributing to them, people can become part of the problem.

Mobile phone:

- Sending humiliating and abusive text or video messages, as well as photo messages and phone calls over a mobile phone.

Abusing personal information:

- Many victims of cyberbullying have complained that they have seen personal photos, emails or blog postings posted where others could see them without their permission.
- Social networking sites make it a lot easier for web users to get hold of personal information and photos of people.
- They can also get hold of someone else's messaging accounts and chat to people pretending to be the victim.

The effects of cyberbullying:

Even though cyberbullying cannot physically hurt children, it can still leave them feeling mentally vulnerable and very upset. Children can also feel scared, lonely and stressed and that there's no way out.

How to deal with cyberbullying:

If a child or someone a child knows is being cyber bullied, they must report it to the school and their parents/carers who can inform the Police. It is important to put a stop to it before it gets any worse.

- Contacting the mobile operator or the instant messenger or social network service provider to report what has happened can also be a useful step.
- As a safety measure to protect children from online risks it is recommended that they should only answer calls from the numbers they know.
- Parents and carers can also contact the NSPCC helpline at any time on 0808 800 5000 if there is a worry about cyberbullying and immediate support is required.
