YEAR 7 SCIENCE


7RB competed in a House competition based on Joule Island. Joule Island is a remote island in the Pacific Ocean.


<u>The Task:</u> You are in a team of 30 scientists who will be staying on the island for 3 years to study it. Your task is to provide the energy the team needs. One ship will bring all your equipment. You will then need to be independent. There are **no** fossil fuels on the island and it is too far from the mainland for them to be brought in. The island has sunny days but cold nights. The wind blows most days, but not in summer. The hot springs are at a temperature of 80°C.

The children were then asked in House teams to allocate everyone a role (leader, graphic designer, researcher or communicator) and to present their work to the class and a panel of Judges. The children were graded on three categories; quality of the presentation, clarity of resources (poster), and accuracy of the science.

The judges, Dr Harries, Mrs Yates, and Mrs Nower were impressed by the overall presentation skills of the Year 7s but one group was agreed to be the overall winner due to the entertaining, accurate and clear way they presented their work. Well done to Freddie, Rayyan and Niamh, and Turing House!

ONLINE SAFETY

Parent information: Social Media Influencers and YouTube.

The things social media influencers do and say online can be quite impactful. Around a third of children think that, because the influencer is a 'celebrity', what they share is always good. But we know that is not the case, sometimes it can be advice based on pseudo-science, selling something because they have been paid to and much more. Social media influencers affect many parts of children lives online and off.

Supporting your child to think critically about the YouTube influencers they follow?

Children can watch so many things on YouTube: videos made especially for children or those made by others their age; educational videos, instructional gaming videos and so much more. However, one thing is certain: children today are more with their favourite YouTube channels and YouTubers and even aspire to become YouTube influencers.

- Parents and caregivers should remember that the <u>YouTube</u> platform is for users over 13 with <u>YouTube</u> <u>Kids</u> available for under-13s.
- Therefore, it's important the use the correct platform for their age to support their development.
- Additionally, no matter which platform your child uses, parents and caregivers can make sure the content is appropriate for them.
- They can help children develop their critical thinking skills by making positive content choices.

Keeping your child safe on YouTube?


- Set the rules for watching videos and that your child (and family) agree with
- Consider setting up a Supervised Account
- Turn on Restricted Mode
- For younger children, use YouTube Kids
- Create playlists with approved content (do not forget to watch the whole video before adding it to your playlist)
- Watch the videos with your child and scroll through the comments as well; there may be some great teaching
 opportunities about empathy and resilience
- Subscribe to approved YouTube channels so your child can watch their favourites. However, YouTube will still offer 'recommended videos' based on watch history unless you <u>turn it off</u>
- If you are re unsure what your child is watching, you can check the watch history


ONLINE SAFETY (CONT.)

Helpful conversations to have with your child:

- Discuss the importance of age limits and sticking to them
- Teach them how to tell if something is an ad (look for the word 'ad' or 'sponsored')
- Remind your child to avoid clicking on ads, no matter how enticing; they should talk to you first
- Teach your child how to block and report videos
- Talk about their favourite influencers; ask them questions and do your research to check them out. The YouTube influencer could actually be a great role model.

If time permits, watch those viral videos and the latest YouTube influencers with your child to spark a conversation about their <u>online world</u>.
