#### FIRST LEGO LEAGUE COMPETITION



On Thursday 8th February with a team of 10, we left school at 8:55am heading for Gatwick Airport STEM Centre. A straight route with an excited group ready to show off all the challenging work they have done over the last few months. On entering the STEM Centre, we saw some familiar faces from last year's competition, this put some of the group at ease. They began setting up their areas with their gaming mats to give them time to practice their coding. Once again, we found that we were up quickly to the robot gaming table within the first 10 minutes. Here we go again!

Their first run did not go as well as they hoped just as last year! Tarquin (as named by the group) was having issues or more appropriately the children were having issues with the coding. The robot got

caught and needed picking up. Joshua decided that it was worth picking up and we were deducted points for having to pick up the robot from the play area. We ended the first run with 95 points but were positive of how to make quick changes to the code.



The presentation was next. The innovation project this year was about the performing arts and how we can increase interest in them. They presented their project very well, highlighting how they had created a website for a virtual programme for school productions that would give video clips of rehearsals



and bios of the actors taking part in" Our House." The judges thought this was a neat solution to getting people more involved and they liked the ease of accessing this by use of a QR code given to the audience members so they could find out the relevant bios about the cast.

The robot judging task went well, the group of children were pressed as to what was the most innovative feature of the robot by the judges. The judges were amazed with the clever use of a colour sensor for programming the robot. One judge said: *"I have been judging this competition for over 5 years and I have never seen such an innovative use of a colour sensor"*. High praise

indeed and they were also thrilled to see the use of a caterpillar track to make a forklift mechanism to help with one of the tasks.



The second run was a little better. The group had managed to rework some of the programming. Finlay and Joshua worked on making some of their new coding better to achieve more reliability while Honor and Daniel worked on improving their code. All these tweaks helped them to a total of 120 points, a worthy haul for the team work to improve the score.

A new part of the competition was to construct some sort of wearable art made from Lego. There was a large mat with a mound of Lego on for teams to try and build and construct the most creative adornment that they could. Several of the children went over and started feverishly creating small parts that could be combined. Kacper, Millie, Sid and Scarlett were keen to get involved initially as was Mrs Fox giving the children

some guidance about things they could make. All the children had a go at getting involved in this in the end and produced an interesting chest and back covering that resembled a tabard! It had the look of a clockwork tin man as it had a key like structure that could turn sticking out of the chest. Sid loved modelling this and a grand job he did of this.

The afternoon session was the last robot run and any last extras added to the body adornment. They tried their best to add more programming and extra tasks but only managed to get 110 points, but they worked hard and contributed well as a team.

The end of the day had arrived and with it the awards ceremony. When I asked the children if they would do this again every single one said they wanted to come back next year and that they really enjoyed the competition and the course of the day. The awards were announced with some local school teams doing well. We improved on last year's trophy and won the award for the best robot design due to our innovative colour programming system. The children were beaming that they had won a major trophy. Let's hope next year will be our lucky



year and Reigate School will win the regional event? The cohort I took were fantastic all day, playing card games with children from other schools and being model students. I could not have asked for a better bunch of children.
