


### SOCIOLOGY

In Sociology the children have been doing some work on the Black Lives Matter movement. In the department, we feel Nyah's work embodies the true spirit of the phrase 'Black Lives Matter'. At its core, the phrase 'Black Lives Matter' is not about politics, or the disregard of other races, it is about recognising that for hundreds of years, the value of black people has existed only in what they bring to the earth, rather than who they are as individuals. Saying 'Black Lives Matter' is recognising that black people matter for who they are, not just what they bring to society. In this current time, it is about mourning the senseless killings of many black people by the hands of those sworn to protect them. Nyah's work names many of these victims. Nyah has not spoken about what they did or what they offered society - she has simply named them, because right now, that is what is most important: naming black people, and recognising the values of their names.



### YEAR 7 AND 8 ENGLISH

Over the past few weeks the children in Year 7 and 8 have been asked to create Greek Gods or Goddesses and their own Pandora's Box as part of their Greek Mythology and allusions unit of work in English. They have created ideas around equality and kindness, which has been lovely to see during this important time. 


Aaron Newsam (Year 8) created a Greek God of equality.

In RE we have focused some lessons on the Black Lives Matter movement and the children were set a written task after a lesson of discussion. The task was to write a piece answering the following questions;

I believe that people are right/wrong to be protesting about the murder of George Floyd. This is because...

Others might disagree with me because...

I believe that violence within some of the protests is justified/unjustified. This is because...

Others might disagree with me because...

I believe protesting is/is not the best way of creating social change. This is because...

Others might argue...

Well done to Alistair Bell, Annie Thompson, Erin Cato, Oliver Shepherd, Joshua Saunders and Ruby Church who submitted some excellent pieces of writing.

I believe that people are right to be protesting about the murder of George Floyd. This is because protesting is a way of people not in positions of power to express their anger of the murder and in large groups of people it can spark change and make justice. Furthermore I believe that it is wright for people to protest because the best way for society to improve is a collective agreement that something is unacceptable in this instance, police brutality.

Others might disagree with me because the presence of a protest can lead to violence and people taking advantage of the mass outrage, leading to looting and destruction of property owned by people who have nothing to-do with what is happening. Furthermore protests can lead to anomie and the break down of social norms and values, eventually the message of the cause is lost as the protests become less about fixing society and more about the destruction of society

I believe that violence within some of the protests is not justified. This is because the cause of the protests is to change the violence of the police and their unjustified brutality to minorities and the violence that the protesters can be seen as hypocritical and the violence does not help the cause and only ruins the good intent of the original protesters. Others might disagree with me because violence is justified because the violence is a build up of anger from many years of police brutality and the George Floyd incident was the tipping point for many people. Furthermore the violence could be seen as a way of people fighting the system and challenging authority which could lead to change.

I believe protesting is the best way of creating social change. This is because protesting is a expression that change is needed and the collective masses coming together openly challenging the system is more powerful than an online petition or sending angry letters. Furthermore protests have been successful in the past efficiently changing society for the better. Others might argue that protests are not the best way of social change because other methods are more efficient and more peaceful. One may argue that directly challenging the law in courts or changing laws in the parliament is a better use of time.

I believe that people are wrong to be protesting about the murder of George Floyd. This is because he wasn't an amazing guy, he was a drug dealer and was in prison, and everyone protesting is making it out like he was a saint when he wasn't. I think they are using his death as an excuse for the protests when they don't need to. These BLM protests should have happened years ago and not because an ex-criminal was killed by a police officer.

Others might disagree with me because they believe that the officer that killed George Floyd was a racist and that he only killed him because of the colour of his skin. The protests are also for all the other innocent black people that were murdered because of their skin.

I do believe that it is good they're protesting but they shouldn't be glorifying George Floyd and instead it should be for everyone who has been effected by racism.

I believe that violence within some of the protests is unjustified. This is because that if someone is violent towards you, you shouldn't be violent back because then you're both the bad person. If it is just the police being violent other people will be angry ant them and protest as well.

Others might disagree with me because they believe that the officers should have a taste of their own medicine and see how they like being attacked for no reason.



Others might disagree with me because they believe that the protests are effective and they show the motivation these people have and show that they will not be giving up anytime soon.



# ISABELLE KIBUUKA






### **JOE WILBY**






### **OUR CHANGING WORLD PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION**
